This course is for students who want to start a career in health, but have a degree in a different field. The enabling course allows domestic students who have completed their undergraduate degree in a different field to complete the essential prerequisite undergraduate-level units for application to our graduate entry master courses.

You may select prerequisite units that you need to become eligible to apply for a postgraduate program. You can study a maximum of four units.

Completion of this enabling course may allow entry to:

- Master of Occupational Therapy
- Master of Nursing Practice
- Master of Pharmacy
- Master of Physiotherapy
- Master of Speech Pathology.

Please note: entry to these master courses is competitive and a strong course weighted average is required.

OCCUPATIONAL THERAPY INDUSTRY SNAPSHOT

Occupational therapists assess the functional limitations of people with illness or disability. They provide therapy to help people perform their daily activities and occupations.

Employment for this occupation has consistently risen very strongly over the past ten years. Looking forward, employment for occupational therapists to November 2020 is expected to grow very strongly.

In 2017, there were 18,755 registered occupational therapists across Australia.

More than 95 per cent of occupational therapists are female, and 62.1 per cent of occupational therapists work full time.

Average weekly hours for full-time workers are 33.6 (compared to 40 for all occupations in Australia).

The average age of those in the profession is 35 years (compared to 40 years for all occupations in Australia).


This graduate entry master course offers you a fast-track option to becoming an occupational therapist.

In this course you will develop knowledge of four broad areas:

- Medical, psychiatric, orthopaedic and neurological conditions that affect the health and wellbeing of individuals.
- The theory and practice of occupational therapy including the study of occupation and analysis of the physical, psychological and social requirements of a variety of skills and activities.
- Human development covering normal growth and development within the life cycle along with problems such as learning disabilities and the effects of ageing.
- Occupational health and management, including prevention, education and rehabilitation programs for a variety of workplaces.

Please note: Essential learning strategies demand that all students have the ability to disrobe appropriately, have the ability to participate fully and are willing to act as patients/clients for their peer group and as mock patients for other students.

COURSE ESSENTIALS



International students: if you are studying in Australia on a student visa, you must study on-campus and full-time.

Some lectures in this course may be attended by both undergraduate and postgraduate students.

ADMISSION CRITERIA

A bachelor degree or equivalent, preferably in a health related discipline with a course weighted average of 65 per cent. However, as selection is competitive, this cut-off may be higher.

Evidence of studies in the human biosciences (e.g. human biology) and psychology or behavioural science is required. If you do not have this background you may be required to undertake additional bridging units. Please refer to the information on the Health Sciences Graduate Entry Foundation course on the previous page.

ENGLISH LANGAUGE PROFICIENCY

This course requires a higher level of English language proficiency: IELTS (Academic) overall band of 7.0 with a minimum of 7.0 in each band (or equivalent English test).

Graduates using the title of occupational therapist must be registered with the Occupational Therapy Board of Australia

Graduates may also apply for registration in most countries, although some countries may require you to sit a licensing examination.

Our key research theme is social inclusion, which reflects our commitment to promoting the inclusion and participation of vulnerable individuals, families and communities in order to achieve better health outcomes, social justice and quality of life.

Under the social inclusion theme, our research falls within four groups:

- 1. Autism.
- 2. Participation and rehabilitation.
- 3. Social policy and practice.
- 4. Research on teaching and learning.

IMPROVING THE LIVES OF CHILDREN WITH CEREBRAL PALSY

Every week, 11 Australian babies are born with cerebral palsy, and there is no known cure. Cerebral palsy is a physical disorder caused by a combination of events that can occur during, before or after birth and lead to an injury in the baby's developing brain.

While there is no known cure, two positive aspects of cerebral palsy are known: the brain injury is non-degenerative, and early intervention can improve the long-term outcomes of children.

Professor Catherine Elliott, Chair of Allied Health at Curtin, is a researcher in the area of neurological impairment. Her expertise in interventions for babies and children with cerebral palsy is contributing to an international stepchange in its diagnosis and treatment.

Professor Elliot is one of 10 Chief Investigators on the Australasian Cerebral Palsy Clinical Trials Network – a five-year national Centre of Research Excellence project. Two of the project's key aims are to develop tools for earlier detection of cerebral palsy, and fast-track children to clinical trials of new 'neuroprotectants'.

"Timely intervention can deliver better lifelong health outcomes for those born with cerebral palsy, but these have often been delayed due to the lack of early diagnosis," explains Professor Elliott.

"Neuroplasticity is the key. If we diagnose early, we can apply interventions that exploit the young brain's immense plasticity." Currently, clinical practice diagnoses cerebral palsy at about 20 months of age. However, the project has produced a new diagnostic tool, called the General Movements Assessment, which can be conducted on babies only 12 weeks old and, according to the data, is 98 per cent

The project will also trial several novel neuroprotectants – medications that may protect neural function and reduce gross and fine motor impairment. The hope is that by the time the project finishes in 2020, one or two neuroprotectants will be implemented and the rate of cerebral palsy will be in marked decline.

"Our aim is for all children to have timely, evidence-based treatment to reduce the impact of the disability, to have a 'better life' culminating in full inclusion," says Professor Elliott.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENTS

Tuition fees are based on a normal full-time workload of 100 credits per semester (200 credits per year) unless otherwise stated. If you study more than 100 credits per semester, you will have a higher annual tuition fee. The tuition fee is calculated in Australian dollars and is charged on a semester basis. Course and individual unit (subject) fees are listed at fees.curtin.edu.au/course_fees.cfm

Please note: all listed fees are subject to annual increases.

OFFER LETTER (100 CREDITS) FEE

As an international student, you need to pay the fees for your first study period (one semester or 100 credits) before arriving in Australia in order to receive a confirmation of enrolment. The fee quoted on the international offer letter is only an approximation and may differ slightly in accordance with the units you choose to study upon your enrolment.

INDICATIVE ESSENTIAL INCIDENTAL FEES

Some courses require compulsory additional payment for retainable materials and course-related fees, known as essential incidental fees.

Some individual units may have optional fees for course materials and other course-related items.

REFUND AGREEMENT

The categories under which the University Fees Centre will assess an application for refund are laid out in the University's International Student Refund Agreement. The agreement is supplied to you with your Letter of Offer and can also be accessed online at fees.curtin.edu.au/refunds.cfm, where you can also view the most up-to-date information as the policy is subject to change.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE PROFICIENCY

Curtin requires all students to demonstrate proficiency in English. You will meet the English language proficiency requirements by demonstrated completion of at least one year full-time of an undergraduate or postgraduate coursework degree at recognised universities in Canada, New Zealand, Republic of Ireland, Singapore, South Africa, United Kingdom or United States of America.

Alternatively, you can demonstrate your English language proficiency via other tests, such as the International English Language Testing System (IELTS) or Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL).

ADDITIONAL REQUIREMENTS

Health sciences students who will be working with children aged from newborn to 17 need to have a Working With Children Check. Your course coordinator will advise you when this is required. Courses that include supervised practice in a clinical setting require screening for and vaccination against a range of infectious diseases before beginning placement. A recognised first aid certificate and a criminal record screening are also necessary.
